President's Message - Pete Wilkens

On Saturday January 25, our annual Member's Meeting was held at the library. Ten members - all of whom are volunteers in our bookstore - attended the meeting. Board members presented summary reports for 2019 activities and plans for 2020, and elections were held for open Board positions. Highlights are as follows:

The financial status of our organization remains robust. In 2019 we had an increase in income, a reduction in expenses, and most significantly, an increase in the support that we provided to the San Clemente Library. Pam Chesney-Algar, who became the San Clemente Branch Manager in 2019, demonstrated the newly acquired cart containing materials for the children's Builder's Club activities, and described the laptop computer kiosk that was funded by the Friends in 2019 and will be in place this year.

We currently have 128 active members and 13 Life members. We appreciate and thank you for being members; please tell your friends and neighbors about the significant support we are able to provide to the library, and encourage them to join us. In 2019 we provided nearly \$70,000 for equipment & furniture; books & media; children's, young adult, and adult programs; and printing & supplies.

The bookstore provides the primary revenue stream for our organization, and is staffed by a roster of 50+ volunteers - for which we are thankful. We are in the enviable position of having enough volunteers to fill the available slots, while providing enough hours to satisfy most of the volunteers' desires.

An interesting statistic that was quickly developed at the meeting from our annual bookstore sales and annual inventory value: we have an annual average turnover of books in the bookstore of 3; or another way of looking at it, the average time that a book resides in the bookstore is 4 months. The bottom line is that we need and value your continued contribution of books.

The annual Meet the Authors Luncheon is another significant source of income for the Friends; this year will be the 20th annual event. Thanks to all of you who have supported this event through the years. I'm pleased to report that all tickets for the February 22, 2020 event have been sold.

At the meeting, we also acknowledged the memorial gifts, an annual grant from Walmart, and contributions made by Friends shopping at Ralphs and at Smile.Amazon.

Branch Manager's Report

We welcome the year of 2020 with a new vision and a line-up of new programming in addition to our regular storytimes and book groups. In February and in March we'll offer a TECH Drop-In program for adults who have questions about devices - phones, tablets, and reader or computer questions. We are planning several authorvisits this spring along with two TED Talks about reducing the stigma of mental health during the month of April. Kids will enjoy a STEM Program series from January through May. Our Lego program, Builder's Club has been so popular we are offering it twice a month. New reading programs will be launched this spring for both children and adults. San Clemente Library recently partnered with the Casa Romantica to present a writing workshop for interested locals.

In a world of "screen distraction", library programs offer live entertainment and face-to-face learning experiences. We are an important gathering place for San Clemente residents and visitors of all ages. Nearly all our library programs are graciously funded by the San Clemente Friends of the Library!

November, December, and January storytimes were attended by 1,165 children and their caregivers. Stay & play program attendees of all ages numbered 1,293. Our Christmas Open House included a marionette puppet show and harpist, Tiffany Wu. We hosted 101 celebrants with snacks and punch! In January 42 children attended our 3-D printing program to make 42 snowflakes!

Thanks to you, our Friends, we were able to purchase some learning, interactive materials for our toddler and preschool crowd. Interactive play is essential to early childhood development, and the kids are loving them!

During the last three months, adult programs were well attended with a total of 21 programs and 344 adult attendees. Adult programs included book groups, workshops, and author lectures. The Knitting Circle has a loyal group of attendees who enjoy each other's company while making blankets, scarves, and other needed items for charity.


This last quarter the Friends of the Library spent \$1,749.83 on books and media for our collection. \$1731.37 went to support our youth programs, and \$1,411.37 was spent on adult programing. Our circulation (check-out) statistics are up 21% from last year, and program attendance has increased by 12 percent.

WAYR: What Are You Reading?

1 The Song of Achilles by Madeline Miller

Like most if not all Friends of the Library, I read and have read so many books that it is sometimes hard to keep them straight. When a book sticks with me, it seems to permeate my thoughts and remind me of the constant, and in this case, "classic" elements of human existence. The Song of Achilles (winner of the 2012 Orange Prize for Fiction) is the first novel written by Madeline Miller, and as the title suggests, it tells the tale of Achilles, son of the sea goddess and a king, in an engrossing, exciting, and fast-moving narrative that ultimately relates a story of enduring love.


Themes that currently dominate our modern-day dialogue are all present, including gender, identity, and politics. Classifications such as "gods", "sub-gods" and "mortals" contribute to behavior and expectations; intolerance and prejudice (fully demonstrated as the story centers around the love of the acclaimed hero Achilles and his "partner" Patroclus); and the conflicts of power and personality that lead to war. It is ultimately the power of love, however, that forms the core of this retold tale.

<u>The Song of Achilles</u> is a well-plotted novel with a fairly simple story, yet it reminds readers of the myths that form the basis of our understanding of history. It reverberates today as it reminds us that history is built on stories as well as facts. The "classics" are designated such because their themes repeat in an attempt to explain elements of humanity in relation to the fates and powers that control origin, destiny, and behavior.

This book is a fresh retelling of a Homeric classic in modern terms with current insight and understanding that is both enjoyable and thought-provoking.

(2) Killers of the Flower Moon by David Grann

First, let me say, anyone who knows me will tell you I am not a non-fiction reader or history buff. However, when you are on vacation and in a foreign country with not a lot of English written books, you find yourself reading what your husband just finished reading. I started this book and could not put it down. It had me hooked in the first few pages.


Somehow my history classes in school (long time ago, no, not the dark ages) they skipped over this important event. This book is a mixture of history lesson, true-crime and thriller all in one. It takes place in Oklahoma in the 1920's and centers around the Osage Indians, their lands, oil and man's thirst for power & money No matter the cost. I can honestly say this

is one book I will never forget.

An invitation from Publication Director Jim Wall:

I once regarded having a bicycle as my first experience of freedom: it allowed me to leave my childhood home and make brief forays into the world on my own. It was exhilirating and filled me with a sense of power and adventure. It wasn't until later that I realized that I had a foretaste of independence long before having a bike: I had learned to read. Reading is a more powerful tool than a bicycle – it carries you further faster.

I premiered *WAYR*: *What Are You Reading?* in the 1st quarter edition of Shore Lines in 2019 with the aim of celebrating the power of reading. My peers on the Friends of the Library Board have been considerate enough to provide articles. 
San Clemente Friends of the Library 20th Annual Meet the Authors Luncheon
